





LOADS OF LOVE



St.Matthew Lutheran Church spread love and joy on Saturday, February 17 at the North Court Laundry,

739 W. Liberty, Medina. Laundry clients had the opportunity to launder their clothes free of charge on February 17, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. (This drop-in event did not require an appointment, but it was "first-come/first serve"!

Upon arriving at the laundromat, all clients were met by our StM caring volunteers who provided the coins needed to wash and dry their clothes and belongings. "Loads of Love" is a ministry that shows love to our community one load at a time." It was funded by our Noisy Offering on January 28, as well as grant support from Thrivent Financial.

The Evangelism and Communication Committee plans to continue this ministry next on **Sunday, June 9**. The mission is to provide laundry services to families and individuals who are in need. This small gift of love helps free up family finances that could be used for groceries or other necessities.

I wish I could remember what the name of the church was. When my husband left he cried. Our dryer ended up breaking recently and our 3-month-old child is very sick. CARE FOR CHILDREN

Led by Melody Costello and Julie Shrader, Care for Children provided essential items to Akron Children's Hospital for children facing illness and hospitalization. With the help of Thrivent members June Trenty, Vernon & Beverly Beard, Karen Strange, Melody & Julie, \$1,500 was secured by Thrivent Action Grants. We purchased toiletries, infant/baby toys, arts & craft supplies, games & toys, books, bears, undergarments & pjs and fleece to make 20 tie blankets. We had an intergenerational Sunday to tie the blankets. Items were blessed during worship services on March 10 and brought to the hospital.

Operation HOMES is a non-profit organization dedicated to serving those experiencing housing insecurity in Medina County, Ohio for the past 30 years. By rotational partnering with local churches for shelter and food and the administration of life skill programs we provide the opportunity for an individual to be independent, both personally and financially. We are one of the only programs of its kind supporting the needs of the county. We currently have 7 cooperative churches to include, Medina United Church of Christ, Prince of Peace Lutheran Church, St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church, Zion Evangelical Lutheran Church, St. Matthew Lutheran Church, Northside Christian Church, and Medina Community Church.

Our church hosts the Operation HOMES guests 1 week out of every 8. The guests rotate week to week at each church starting on the Monday of each week. The program is designed to be short term (90 days) but oftentimes housing placement becomes an issue due to lack of available affordable housing and landlords not accepting the various vouchers our guests receive for housing. Often time our guests are stuck waiting for an apartment or housing to open up with either the money they saved or the housing voucher they have acquired. At the beginning of 2025, Medina Metropolitan Housing Authority (MMHA) will open the counties first, 28 bed, homeless shelter. In conjunction with MMHA, Operation HOMES will also be transforming our role in the community, to provide another service that is currently being underserved in the county, Transitional Housing. Transitional Housing will serve those families that have graduated, in a sense, from the shelter to the temporary housing program to assist in their quest to find permanent affordable housing.



This is especially near and dear to our church, as St. Matthew previously was the shepherd of Transitional Housing ministry for quite some time. We will begin our full-time transition into this venture come July 2024. St. Matthews also hosts the Day Center, where guests in the program, during the week, have a place to relax, search for jobs, and utilize the myriad of other resources to assist in their search for affordable housing.

St. Matthew is Helping Save Lives

Every two seconds someone in the U.S. needs blood. It is essential for surgeries, cancer treatment, chronic illnesses, and traumatic injuries. Since blood and platelets cannot be manufactured, it must come from generous donors like us. Donating blood takes about an hour. It includes an initial health history; the collection of a pint of blood and a snack in the "canteen".

In 2022, St. Matthew began hosting blood drives to help collect blood for the American Red Cross. We have held 5 blood drives and collected a total of 130 units of blood. One unit of blood can help up to 3 people. We have St. Matthew members and community members who are regular donors.

Whether a patient receives whole blood, red cells, platelets or plasma, this lifesaving care starts with one person making a generous donation. Will you be a donor at our next drive, June 29? Feel free to contact Melody Costello for information about being a donor.

Feeding Medina County

Have you been hungry? Not hungry by missing a meal, but hungry by not having an adequate supply of food? If you're like me, you haven't known this hunger and you feel appreciative for always having a full belly. Maybe, though, you have been in a position of inadequate food.

Four-thousand residents in Medina County are food insecure; meaning they don't know where their next meal is coming from. This number includes children and adults of all ages.

As a church, we committed to donating \$1,000 this year to help Feeding Medina County feed our neighbors in need. They provide various food resources including weekly weekender bags for elementary children throughout the year; monthly bags of food to low-income seniors and 4 monthly food distributions throughout the county for anyone experiencing food insecurity as well as food to those who come to their office.

There are about 25 food pantries throughout Medina County, mostly in churches, providing some type of food resource from groceries to hot meals for those fighting food insecurity. In February, we held our first "drive-thru" food drop off. Food collected was donated to United Methodist Church's food pantry and the fruit cups to Feeding Medina County for the weekender program.

In November 2023, our Luther Middles collected food. That food was organized and bagged and will be given to individuals who come to St. Matthew who may need food. We also have a free food box outside the church where individuals can leave donations and those in need can grab food as needed.

We will be looking at other ways to continue to help the food insecure, so keep your eyes on our various communication sources. St. Matthew is helping to nourish our neighbors and we thank you for your support.

ARCHIVING OUR DOCUMENTS

Late last year our Church Council President asked me to head a committee which would "Do the Archives"! My first task was to assemble a group of interested individuals and together "Do the Archives". We immediately recognized the need for a policy which would guide us through the many decisions of determining the archival worthiness of the various documents. By using examples from other organizations along with the guidance from our synod and the ELCA, we developed a policy for St Matthew. At this moment the policy is nearly complete.

This project does not just happen. It requires supplies, storage, and many hours of work, scanning, replicating and organizing. Most archivists, including the ELCA require the preserved documents be saved as hard copies, on acid free paper, in acid free folders, in acid free boxes, on acid free shelves, in climate-controlled storage space.

Even in today's world of digital everything, archival is to be on hard copies. To make the records more accessible we are scanning everything which is archival worthy. The records need to be accessible for our staff and very importantly accessible to anyone with a legitimate desire to do research. It will be much easier to search via the computer than the thousands of documents in storage.

In 1990, paper supply companies began providing acid free copy paper. So, records after 1990 can be stored in acid free folders and boxes, while documents before 1990 need to be replicated on to acid free paper, before being stored.

Several of our church members applied for and received \$250 debit card funds from Thrivent Financial. With these funds, we are securing paper, folders, boxes, external hard drives and miscellaneous items for the job.

Currently, we are replicating all the pre-1990 documents. This is requiring cartons of copy paper and many hours of labor. For example, newspaper articles that have been saved over the years is going to require more than two reams of paper to replicate. (One ream is 500 pages) Newspaper clippings are not archivable because they are not on acid free paper.

PERSONAL RECOLLECTIONS OF THE PAST

as written by Oscar Bloch, Circa 1990

St. Matthew Congregation's beginning was on Memorial Day, 1936 when Rev Carl Henkelman and his family came to the Bloch home in Lafayette Township. Since it was rather common custom in those days for a pastor and his family to be invited to dinner by one of the parish families and as members of St. Paul in Berea, my parents invited the Henkelman family to celebrate that holiday with us.

Following dinner and clean-up, we gathered in the living room for a devotional service and also for a blessing of our new home, since we had moved here from Brookpark in early March. Following the service and blessing, the conversation turned to the subject of a Lutheran church in the area. At that time, there were no Lutheran churches in the Medina village. I, quite young at the time, clearly remember being embarrassed by a statement being made by my mother in her fractured German-English language, "It is unspossable that there doesn't be a Lutheran church in Medina." Pastor Henkelman, who was to attend the Annual Ohio Convention in June, informed us he would inquire as to starting a mission church in Medina.

In early July, he brought us some survey forms and informed us we would have to find out how many Lutheran families there were in the area. Although we were not "survey wise", my brother and two sisters made the rounds of families and found, as I recall, fourteen who were Lutheran. This was submitted the following June by Pastor Hinkelman, but we had little hope of having approval for a mission church. God, however, works in strange and beautiful ways, and by His grace, there were two people at the convention who were familiar with the village of Medina and surrounding area; Otto Myers from Zion in Valley City and Dr. Frank Reutter from Zion in Spencer.

They stated there were more than fourteen families in and around Medina and set the stage for a follow-up survey. The move to start the mission gathered momentum and reached its climax on February 6, 1938.

At 2:30 on a warm Sunday, the first service was held in the little store front on West Washington St. It was filled with people, standing room only, both front and rear doors open.

The original store front site was located where the Medina Camera Shop now stands. It was at that time in the third block, with the alley to the west giving access to Wallace Farm Implement Sales.

Mrs. Mildred Reutter played the organ, it being a donation to the congregation by her and her husband.

At that time, St. Matthew was part of a two-fold mission thrust know at St. Peter's. Pastor Waldo E. Byers was the first pastor and would conduct services in Lodi from nine to ten and then drive to Medina to hold services at St. Peter's. In 1940, the Mission in Lodi held its last service. In 1940 or 1941, the mission received its Charter as St. Matthew Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Through the kindness of the Reutter family, a twobedroom home on St. Elmwood became the rent-free parsonage.

St. Matthew continued to grow under its second pastor, Weldon Bittekoffer, who, by borrowing money from his father, purchased the site where the present-day church is located. Financial assistance for the present sanctuary built in 1950 came from the sale of the "store front church", which had been deeded to the congregation by the Otto Meyer family. It was built with much donated labor by the members and some of our Christian brothers from St. Francis. Rev. Henry Young was our pastor at that time and was really the driving force that convinced the membership that it could be done.

The picture of the stone church hanging in the south stairway entrance served as a guide for the design used for our present structure. This church, which is in Michigan, was designed by the Akron architect Adam Fichter, who also designed the first educational unit built in 1961.

In 1955, when the new parsonage was built across the street from the church, title to the former parsonage was turned over to the congregation. Proceeds of its sale were used to help pay for the new building. The lot adjacent to Dr. Reutter's office was also deeded to the congregation. Norm Gerspacher, General Contractor of the new parsonage, directed the men of the church in their labor of love. The women of the church provided a good supply of sandwiches and coffee, as well as band aids for bruised fingers.


St. Matthew has been blessed in its first fifty years of life. Many times, after 1950, the Meyers, Reutter and Laribee families generously assisted the congregation through financial hard times far in excess of a tithe.


There is of course much more to the history of St. Matthew. Like any family, there were differences of opinions and members would leave, but these were not disasters but the will of God. Out of one of these times, Prince of Peace Lutheran Church began its life as a mission congregation.


Currently, there are only a handful of people who attended that first service who are still at St. Matthew: Mildred Reutter, Ella Geyer Burke, Florence Hitzelberger Gerspacher, Clara Hitzelberger Gorfido and myself. The daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Schnettler (charter members); Una Mae Gill, Leithea Obermeier, and Lois Davis are still members. Mr. and Mrs. William Garnett, charter members, presently reside in Michigan.

St. Matthew is and always has been a congregation whose members love one another, sharing burdens in times of loss, and rejoicing with one another in times of joy; celebrating good fortune and sharing misfortune. St. Matthew has been blessed and strengthened by its willingness to welcome into its family people of other denominations and this attitude will continue to make St. Matthew unique in its outreach and mission.

When St. Matthew held its first service on that first Sunday afternoon in February, I never believed that God would grant me the privilege to see the day she would celebrate her fiftieth year. Looking back, I count my blessings for me and my family!












St. Matthew has 30 members who are Thrivent clients. Last year. \$3,000 in action grants were applied for. These grants purchased yarn to make hats for
